The Pastor's Pen - December 2025

Dear Church Family,

As I'm sure most all of us do, when we get to this season, floods of memories of past Christmases will float through our minds, hopefully often causing a smile to come to our faces. I'll think about Christmases past with family members that are no longer with us and perhaps haven't been for some time. On Christmases at my grandparents' house, which is always where we had dinner, my grandfather always had to have a mincemeat pie. He's the only one that would ever eat from it, but he had to have it. He was the type that would eat tongue and headcheese sandwiches. My first Christmas away from all of that was my second year in college which found me in Jerusalem with a bunch of folks without family or tradition to celebrate. A few of us decided that we would not forego the holiday and so we got a Christmas tree (it was more of a branch than an actual tree), and we decorated it with paper chains and some other craftily designed ornaments, and then we planned our Christmas dinner. Around the table was a grouping from New York and Philly, Kenya, Germany, Israel and a Palestinian. Each of us brought something so it was more of a potluck, but it was different from what I'd always known, and just as special.

I always think too about our first Christmas with our first born. He was already 10 months, and we spent so much time getting him the correct toys that would start him on his way to being something brilliant. And when I say we spent time, we really did visit every bustling toy store in Bethlehem, and there were always many. We got him a rubber ball that doubled as a globe of the world, a house about the size of a shoe box with various shaped pieces, with each shape designed to fit into a specific hole in that roof. We got him some simple puzzles and a few other things. I wrapped everything all nice and neat and put them out of his sight, not that that was difficult. And then the only thing that he was actually even remotely interested in on Christmas morning was the wrapping paper. That was actually a good lesson.

And of course, there are plenty of memories made at whatever church it may have been before finding ourselves at WMPC. Naturally, midnight mass for me growing up, but then since becoming a pastor, there have been a handful of memories and Christmas experiences to truly hold onto. Christmas being canceled because of snow; that happened a couple times in Iowa, but then here in the state of New Jersey we get to Christmas during Covid. Remember how when it first started, we all assumed we'd be back to church by Easter? Christmas service over Zoom was what I was able to do, so we did, but it was also probably the weirdest church experience for a Christmas for me that ever was.

This Advent and Christmas time, I believe, is a time for us to think about what the birth of Jesus Christ so long ago from us now actually means, with us specifically directed to think about

Hope, Joy, Peace and Love, and how they play into what really is the world's biggest birthday party each year.

I do invite and encourage folks to really consider what the birth of Christ meant and continues to mean to the world and to us personally. For I don't think that any of us could ever try to deny that the birth of Christ did change our world like no other birth or event. Think about that; no other birth or event. Perhaps we should also be asking, what would the world be like if Christ had never come to us? That one should definitely push us to consider the possibilities, as frightening as I'm sure they would be.

So rejoice! Rejoice in what God has done for us, in leading us back to him. Starting with that birth in a cave surrounded by farm animals. A most remarkable birth to say the least!

It is hard to believe the end of 2025 is nearing. The church has the excitement of Advent to look forward to in the coming weeks. Children's Christmas Pageant will be held on Sunday, December 21st and special music is planned for our Christmas Eve Service at 9 PM on Wednesday, December 24th. A Blue Christmas Service will be offered at 3 PM on Sunday, December 14 at the Ringwood Community Presbyterian Church offering a feeling of hope to those that may be in despair during the holiday season.

Year-end also means work to be done by Session:

- The Personnel Committee completed their yearly performance reviews for staff members Pastor Chris and Sandy Muzzillo. Comments from Deacons and Session were solicited in advance as part of the process and salaries were reviewed for the coming year.
- A review of our membership rolls by the Session Clerk is completed before year end to ensure our records remain current. We value every member of our church – even those who may be unable to attend services or participate in the life of the church. The process of moving someone from membership begins with a review by Session. If it is deemed a person or family has moved on for a reason, a letter will be sent asking if membership should be moved to a FRIENDS list. This special list allows us to remain in contact with people, including them in monthly newsletters and news blasts containing important details within the life of the church. Moving off the membership rolls keeps our records relevant and helps Presbytery and PCUSA understand how to plan & offer programs based upon the church populations they serve. No one will be removed from membership without permission, or lack of response from our letter.
- Finance Committee will be working to create a balanced budget for the new year. Pledging is an important element in this process because it gives the committee an expectation of funding they can expect to receive. If you have not yet pledged, we urge you to do so ASAP along with checking to make sure your PER CAPITA fee of \$48/member has been paid BEFORE year end.

We are happy to announce three families will be joining our membership rolls. We welcome the Michelotti, Bean, and Semeraro families. We look forward to more new members in the year ahead. Wishing everyone in our church family a Merry Christmas.

PC(USA) Co-Moderator explains ‘The Moses Mistakes’

LOUISVILLE — Donning a beard briefly to help those in worship accept his character, the Rev. Tony Larson personified four big mistakes Moses made along the way while leading the people out of enslavement in Egypt and completing his assignment at the cusp of the Promised Land.

Larson, Co-Moderator of the 226th General Assembly, preached during closing worship of the Moderators Conference, held Friday and Saturday online and at the Chapel in the Presbyterian Center in Louisville, Kentucky.

During closing worship, the Rev. Tony Larson put on a second beard to portray Moses.

Before he put on the beard and began preaching, Larson and his fellow Co-Moderator, the Rev. CeCe Armstrong, anointed those in worship. “God has heard you say ‘here I am,’ and God will be with you,” Larson said.

“I had a decent life once,” Larson said as Moses. “Then I made four catastrophic errors that dragged me into 40 years of the hardest work I’ve ever done.”

While tending sheep one day, Moses spotted a bush on fire without being consumed. “I should have noted it and moved on, but I stopped to look at this great sight,” he said. The burning bush made Moses remember some of his worst behavior, including killing an Egyptian man and hiding his body.

“Something else in those flames: righteous anger, burning injustice at empire’s cruelty,” he said. “God’s anger burns without being consumed, and then I knew that God had been hearing [the people’s] cries all along.”

“Once your eyes are opened — once you sense God’s anger at injustice — you can’t go back like nothing happened.”

Moses heard his name being called: “Moses, Moses.” “Not, ‘hey shepherd,’” he said. “I said without thinking, ‘Here I am.’ That was mistake number 2. ... The absolute foolishness of responding before you know.”

“God had been watching, listening, knowing all the things I had been trying not to do for 40 years. ... The bush that burned without being consumed? That was about to be me.”

"I should have cut my losses, but instead I made mistake number three: I asked the question, 'Who am I that I should go to pharaoh?'"

"God said, 'I will be with you,' which isn't an answer to my question at all. It was a promise I didn't know what to do with," he said. "I wasn't being sent to ask pharaoh nicely, but to challenge the entire logic of empire, which runs on only the principle of scarcity. God runs on the principle of abundance, God's provision."

"I was called to dismantle pharaoh's hierarchy. Don't ask a question that might reveal what God is about to do," he said.

"After making those mistakes, I was on a roll and I thought I'd make another: I went and got involved in other people's problems," he said. "I stood in front of pharaoh and said, 'Let my people go.' Pharaoh said, 'Who is this God that I should listen?' It's always empire's first move, denial."

"Pharaoh made it worse for those enslaved people I came to help," he said. "The people turned on me, saying 'We were better off before you showed up.' That's what happens when you get involved in other people's problems, especially when they are rolled into empire."

"Ten plagues, 10 confrontations. Finally we crossed the sea, [Miriam danced](#), and we tasted freedom," he said. "Then came 40 years of wandering and 40 years of complaining: 'At least in Egypt we had good food.'"

"At the end of 40 years, I stood on a mountain and looked at the Promised Land, the land I had been leaning into my entire life," he said. Mistake number 4 was getting involved in other people's problems, and what did it get me? [An unmarked grave in Moab.](#)"

"Don't make my mistakes, unless you want to see God work, unless you want to see the enslaved become free, participate in God's breaking empire's grip — unless you want your life to mean something beyond comfort and security."

"I realize I would make those mistakes again," he said. "They weren't mistakes. They were the only real choices I ever made. ... Those mistakes were when I aligned my life with what was already going on in the world. Yes, it cost me everything, but I gained the privilege of seeing God's abundance defeat pharaoh's scarcity."

"I never reached the Promised Land, but I spent my whole life moving toward it, and that was enough," he said.

Stepping out of character and then back into it, Larson told the moderators that as they return to their mid councils, "you will encounter your own burning bush. Maybe someone is going to offer you the tools of empire."

"When you see that burning bush and the empire says, 'take my tools,' make my mistakes. Ask the questions. Dig deeper. Get involved. Take on other people's problems. Stand with the oppressed and refuse to play by pharaoh's rules or pick up pharaoh's tools."

"It will cost you something, but you will spend your entire life moving toward the Promised Land," he said. "Friends, even from this side of the mountain, I can tell you it's enough. It's more than enough. I'd make the mistakes again. Go and make it so."
