

SESSION'S REFLECTIONS

Most of us have been hoping that by the time year 2022 came, the restrictions of the pandemic would be behind us. Unfortunately, January found us making hard decision about closing our in-house worship and church building usage due to the dangerous increase in covid variants in our area. Our focus is always to keep our doors open to the public, however safety of those we serve must remain a priority. As Session discussed reopening plans, we proceeded with the understanding we all hold responsibility for our own health and safety. There are precautions we can personally take to protect ourselves. It is with this mindset we formed the following protocol list when visiting our church:

- Masks must be worn by everyone inside our buildings
- Social distance of 6 feet should be observed as best as possible
- Social events such as coffee hour are being postponed until further notice. All socializing should take place outside.
- When utilizing building space, use disinfectant wipes to clean all surfaces upon entry and exiting a work area. Wipes will be made readily available by property committee in all public areas.
- If you are ill, or have been exposed to Covid, we ask that you refrain from visiting the church until CDC guidelines indicate it is safe to return.
- We offer virtual clips of all our worship services. If you feel uncomfortable attending services, we hope to see you viewing our services through the facebook link: west milford presbyterian.

We want to offer a special thanks to Pastor Choi for keeping our services current during our closure by creating virtual worship opportunities, despite his battle with another covid infection.

Another special thank you goes to our hard-working Finance Committee. Much time, effort, and research went into presenting a balance budget for year 2022. They manage to stretch our decreasing dollar resources to continue to cover all the critical expenses and outreach efforts of our church.

We look forward to great participation in our virtual auction scheduled for February 24 to 26. This is a major fund raiser for our church and will be critical to keep our budget for the year in balance. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

JANUARY 2022

Covid has affected our church and Sunday School again and it was so disappointing to miss our Christmas Eve services, our post-Christmas Sunday and the brightest Sunday of Epiphany. Classes resumed on January 16th with masks required throughout the church and Sunday School. We realize how important it is to protect our little children who are yet to be vaccinated. Also, thank you to Ms. Ashlee Smart for helping with our youth classes until the mask mandate is lifted.

Along with catching up with the lessons that were missed, our children have been enjoying teachings about "God's Abundant Love" through the story of the miracle Jesus performed at the wedding in Cana when he turned water into wine. Also, the children were versed in the celebration of marriage and the customs that were practiced "back in the day." Through this miracle, Jesus is revealed. This miracle speaks of God bringing extravagance and abundance into everyday life. God's glory and unending love (in abundance) are revealed, and the disciples believe in Jesus as do all the people at this wedding who saw this miracle happen.

The children continued to learn about God's Spirit. Jesus reinforces the fact that God will help them understand and practice God's good ways, and they will be supported by their experiences of loving, caring relationships in their own family and in their faith community. Jesus speaks of God's Spirit which the children may experience as a feeling of God being with them, and that it is God's hope that hearing the good news will lead to living in God's way. They learned when people help each other they are sharing the good news of God's love. Lastly, the children were reminded that Jesus brought the good news of God's love for all people and that God will help us understand and practice God's good ways of living. However, they learn that what God wants for our lives and all creation does not always coincide with what they may want. God calls them to speak out, telling of God's love and justice for all people.... especially if they are different from themselves. We learn that Jesus is now spreading the good news in different towns in the area, he is performing miracles, and crowds are coming to listen to Him, as He is getting closer to the "cross."

The planning of our next communicant's class is underway. Again, such decisions are impacted by covid spread and constrictions. Please remember to have your children wear masks to Sunday School until further notice. Thank You.

Just because the weather is cold, windy, snowy, or rainy doesn't mean our doors close. We continue to serve new clients. Some have been able to find employment and they call to tell us how much they appreciated the help we were able to give. This is why we do what we do.

There are some items that we aren't in need of at this time. These include dried pasta, tuna fish, and cake mixes. Items that we most often run out of are:

sugar, flour, vegetable oil, toilet paper, paper towels, laundry detergent, tissues, pudding cups, salad dressings, juice bottles adult cereals, and spam.

RECIPE ROUNDUP

ALOHA PARADISE BARS

(makes about 24 bars)

Wishing you were lying on a tropical island right about now? Satisfy that feeling by baking up a pan of these cookie bars. They make a lot so share with family and friends.

Ingredients:

1 pouch Betty Crocker sugar cookie mix

½ cup butter, softened

1 egg

2 cups white vanilla baking chips

1 cup coarsely chopped dried pineapple or mango

1 cup flaked coconut

1 cup chopped macadamia, walnuts, or pecans

1 can (14 ounce) sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated)

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Spray bottom only of a 13 x 9 inch pan. In a large bowl, stir cookie mix, butter and egg until soft dough forms. Press dough into the bottom of the baking pan.

Bake 15 minutes. Remove pan and sprinkle with baking chips, pineapple or mango, coconut and nuts. Drizzle evenly with sweetened condensed milk.

Return pan to oven and bake 30 to 35 minutes longer or until light golden brown. COOL COMPLETELY.

Cut into small bars. I usually do 9 rows by 4 rows. Store covered in the refrigerator.
