I wonder what people saw and thought about in October 1517? Did they know what was coming? Did Martin Luther really see it either? My guess is no, he didn't. Would Luther have held back his 95 Theses if he knew what would happen? Would he have done it sooner?

Sometimes we hold back because we are afraid of what might be involved. Sometimes we hold back because we don't think it really matters.

When we think of the ongoing discussions on climate change, immigration and refugee issues, poverty, etc.- how are you responding? Or are you? Why or why not?

Are you prepared like Luther was to take a stand based on Scripture and reason? Or is your stand based on something else (and is it something beyond opinion- yours or someone else's)?

Notice that Luther's "Stand" wasn't about standing still, it was about reforming, progressing, and changing. It was not change for change's sake, but because the Holy Spirit reminded him of God's enduring grace and promise of a future with hope. The Gospel is about love of God and new life through Jesus, our Savior. October is Reformation month. Especially on Reformation Sunday (10/30), we seek to respond to God's baptismal calling to let our light shine with the message of God's love and new life for the world. Think of the great things we can do, responding out of what God has given us as we seek to follow Jesus who leads us into the future!

SESSION'S REFLECTIONS

OCTOBER 2022 SUBMITTED BY BETSY ENGELHARDT, CLERK OF SESSION

We were fortune to gather with Deacons in September for a joint meeting to discuss goals and objectives for the year ahead. The theme for this meeting was "Who Is the Church?", with the focus being that our congregation will ultimately be responsible for the growth, vitality, and success of the future of our ministry and outreach efforts. Our leadership numbers at year end will be at crisis levels if membership does not offer their God given gifts and talents to positions being vacated in 2023. There is a need for a volunteer pool to be established to support those that offer their leadership skills. Great ideas were shared and there will be a formal presentation to our congregation in November that will prove a building block for a successful path forward for our church. Another unsustainable mission project we face is our food pantry and the increased demand for our services. Currently only 4 members provide the labor needed 2 full days a week for 52 weeks a year. They are fortunate to have the support of volunteers from the Plant church who are willing to be trained and mentor and eventually provide much needed relief. Session approved access to Fellowship Hall on predetermined days and times to facilitate this vital support.

Clerk of Session was tasked by Presbytery to compile an Administrative Operational Manual which contains policies, procedures, forms, handbooks, and other documentation used to ensure conformity and adherence in our daily church operations. This manual will be continually updated by Clerk of Session and the church secretary with a binder copy filed in the church office and electronically on the church computer.

Ringwood Presbyterian Church has approached our Worship committee for the prospect of loaning several octaves of our brass bells. In return, they would host handbell performances at our church. Session approved this loan with a detailed loan agreement signed and witnessed to ensure their safekeeping and protection for our church if damaged, lost, or stolen.

The month of October is traditionally pledge drive month. The theme for this year is *Keep the Faith*. There will be moments for mission throughout the month detailing needs with Consecration Sunday scheduled for October 30.

Session voted to extend Pastor Choi's interim contract from November 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022 with a 30 day cancellation clause by either party and he has accepted that extension. PNC received the news that Presbytery voted on a 5% increase in minimum effective salaries and board of pensions passed a 2% increase effective 2023. Finance and Wm. Association provided updated reports that will support our continued search for a full-time solo pastor for our church with these increased commitments.

PASTORAL NOMINATING COMMITTEE

OCTOBER 2022 UPDATE - BETSY ENGELHARDT, PNC MODERATOR

The committee has been hard at work during the summer months which produced some fruitful prospects to consider for nomination. In anticipation for proceeding further in our process than ever before, I'd like to prepare our members for what may lie ahead. The greatest analogy I can provide is to consider our process the same way we elect the President of our United States.

- Candidates have been campaigning by submitting their MIF's and participating in interviews.
- PNC decides what candidate they want to bring forward as their nomination to hold this position. They prepare an offering package that will help the candidate in his/her personal discernment.
- Candidate accepts (hopefully) the nomination.
- After nomination, candidate will engage with the voters through a meet-and-greet that will be scheduled the day before "election day".
- Election day is a Sunday worship conducted entirely by the candidate with a congregational meeting scheduled immediately after. Members will vote the candidate in or out at this meeting.
- If voted in, a future start date will be negotiated wherein the candidate begins his/her ministry for our church.

The committee asks for your continued prayers for not only the PNC, but also for any candidate that may be considered for nomination. Ultimately it is in God's hands who is listening to our prayers and leading us all in the path he sees for our future.

Wow 2022 is already more than half over, where did the time go? We have gone from pandemic to partial recovery and now recession. Our lives have been turned inside out and upside down. Some of us have lost loved ones, jobs, and material assets we depended on. Can we continue to persevere and grow stronger? We can if we Keep the Faith. We were able to refurbish some of the outside buildings and replace the windows in the sanctuary.

Unfortunately, looking at our monthly financial statements, it is clear our current spending covers only the essentials for us to keep our buildings and staff operating at a minimal. Our "Per Capita" obligations to our Presbytery are suffering a shortfall of almost \$1200.00, funded by money yet to be paid by our membership. Let's **Keep the Faith** by helping the WMPC keep its doors open so that we can continue to help our community.

If this church has provided you and / or your family a place of worship, a haven, please consider donating so that our doors can remain open to those in our community. If you no longer actively attend services, but your children found spiritual nourishment through our church school, if you were married in our sanctuary, found comfort during funeral services for a loved one, were uplifted by our music programs, were helped by our food pantry, enjoyed fellowship with members, found spiritual strength during hardships, please we need your financial support so others may experience the same. If you understand that personal sacrifice is part of God's lessons; we urge you to complete a pledge card for 2023. A one-time contribution, weekly, or monthly pledge will help us preserve our future. If your obligation of a suggested \$48.00 per member due in 2022 for Per Capita has not been paid, we urge you to please consider payment today. PER CAPITA

Per Capita is an annual assessment made by the presbyteries, synods, and General Assembly of our Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Our session is committed to paying the full assessment for all the members on our roll because we treasure our relationship with the wider church, and the congregation benefits when members contribute their share to the whole. Note that this charge is PER MEMBER, therefore, if you are husband/wife members, your obligation would be two times the yearly Per Capita fee. If you have a teenager who is confirmed at our church, your child immediately becomes a member of our church and will be charged a Per Capita fee at the start of a new year. Why do we pay this assessment known as per capita? Because we value our Presbyterian heritage and identity. As a congregation we derive many material benefits from our Presbyterian association. At the General Assembly level, these include the oversight of preparation for ministers and the mechanisms for calling new ministers, the maintenance of the wonderful Presbyterian historical collection in Philadelphia, the biennial meeting of the General Assembly, resources ranging from training for ruling elders to assistance with immigration, and so much more. The synod provides the training and discernment for Presbytery and church leaders. The presbytery portion enables support of our congregation's mission through counseling support for churches in many crises. Historically, the fee changes each year. For the year 2022, the Per Capita fee per member is suggested at \$48. For year 2023, the fee will remain at a suggested \$48 per member. It is important that your payment reference PER CAPITA on your check or giving envelope so it is properly directed to the correct fund. We look forward to your participation in per capita giving for this past year and beyond, an expression of your commitment to ministry both within our congregation and beyond.

ON-LINE DONATIONS

Donating on line is very simple. Visit WMPCHURCH.ORG. You will find a DONATE ON-LINE link on the bottom right corner of our home page. If you'd like to make a one-time donation, the main page will easily accommodate that transaction. This is a great way to demonstrate from afar your appreciation for the work done at our church through a donation to ensure our doors will remain open to our community. If you would like to be a regular contributor, please follow the link to SIGN IN and create your own account.

PLEDGE CARDS

You do not need to be a member of our church to submit a pledge card. You do not need to submit a pledge card in order to provide regular financial support to the church. Pledge cards, however, are a vital tool used by the Finance Committee to set up balanced budgets each year. It helps guide the committee on what funds will be available to cover the church expenses throughout the year. Please consider using your pledge card to communicate what financial commitment you can provide the church in the year ahead.

GIVING ENVELOPES

Envelopes will be ordered and available for distribution at the end of the year. These help organize your weekly giving and alert you to special payments such as Per Capita, Building, and special holiday gifts. As a regular contributor, you are assigned an envelope number which identifies you in our computer records. Referring to your envelope number whenever making a donation will help ensure credit will be properly allocated. If you are new to giving and would like an envelope assigned to your name, please contact the church office.

 - + Apple sauce

 - + Condiments (Ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, salad dressings)
- + Canned (soups, vegetables, fruit, tuna, chicken, beans, hash, chili, Spam) + Pasta sauce
 - + Pasta (all varieties)
 - + Potato and pasta mixes
 - + Rice and rice mixes
 - + Mac & cheese
 - + Hamburger Helper
 - + Baking items (flour, sugar, oil)
 - + Snack items (cookies, crackers, chips, pretzels, granola bars)
- + Personal Care (soap, shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, razors, toothpaste, toothbrushes, feminine products, baby wipes)
 - + Household items (toilet paper, paper towels, napkins, dish detergent, liquid laundry detergent-no pods, cleaning products)



RECIPE ROUND-UP

Mixed Roasted Vegetables

A great recipe for the fall weather. Serve with roasted meats or even as a sandwich topped with grated parm cheese. Yields about 6 servings and leftovers are great. Don't cut the veggies too small.

- 2 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 1 ½ teaspoons basil leaves (fresh if you can) chopped
- 1 1/2 teaspoons garlic salt
- 1 / 2 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 1 / 8 teaspoon cayenne (if you don't like heat leave it out)
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 4 peppers cut into chunks (can use green, red, yellow, orange, whatever is on sale)
- 1 medium zucchini cut into chunks
- 1 medium yellow summer squash cut into chunks
- 1 peeled sweet potato cut into small chunks
- 1 large yellow or red onion cut into chunks
- Fresh mushrooms (I use button ones, about 7 8 cut into chunks
- Set oven to 400 degrees

In a medium bowl mix brown sugar with the next 4 ingredients. Set aside. Place all of the cut up veggies in a large bowl. Drizzle with the oil and toss with your hands. Add half of the brown sugar mixture and toss to coat. Add remaining brown sugar mixture and toss well. Spread out veggies on a baking sheet. Roast for about 15 minutes. Stir and continue to roast for another 10 - 15 minutes checking for doneness. (some people like a bite to the veggies, others like them soft)


Can be eaten right away or at room temperature. Store covered in the refrigerator.
