## The Pastor's Pen – October 2025

Dear Church Family,

And so here we are at the start of another month, and what a month we've been living through. I feel like it would be irresponsible of me to not address the things that are happening in this nation that we all are certainly blessed to live in. And I can say that with the experience of having lived in countries where you had to be careful about what you said, and in the presence of whom. I've had my phones tapped, and I've had my mail gone through and ripped open, and I've been threatened with being separated from my family. We've also had our home targeted with soldiers coming in the middle of the night with guns drawn, and having it tear gassed during the day while being under strict house curfew, which meant that we were not allowed to leave our homes for days at a time without the chance of being shot, and then only having a few hours to run for groceries when the curfew was lifted.

That's not an experience that the most recent generations have known if they've lived their entire lives in this country. And I will also say that that's one of the greatest blessings that recent generations in the US have never really seemed to realize is something unique, and so it's been therefore taken for granted; not by all, but certainly by most. And what I'm expressing here doesn't mean that everywhere around the world is so much worse off than we here. I truly believe that every country has something spectacular to bring to the table, things that can leave us speechless. AND, there are other countries in the world where people have actually more personal rights than we here, and they are not tearing each other apart. Mainly because education is taken seriously.

The fact of the matter is that the issues that we have are ones that many countries shake their collective heads at and wonder what can possibly go on inside our collective minds to allow what's going on. For instance, gun violence is not just a problem, but a plague. The United States is 28<sup>th</sup> in the world for gun deaths, falling below only countries in Central and South America, where the gang violence is so bad, that it's created the latest version of our forever years old immigration problem, which actually started with the country's founding. (God forbid to have been Irish in the 1850's or have been brought on slave boats over those previous two hundred years!) But you see how one thing can create another? Imagine what would be different if our government would actually try to deal with the US gun manufacturers who are selling a great amount of their products to Central and South America; feeding the violence, which feeds migration. Most things connect along the way, which should teach us that our actions DO affect the world that we live in; and that could have to do with anything from recycling or getting an electric car, or engaging with a community organization, or writing to your congress people, or taking part in a peaceful demonstration, or doing one or more of countless other things. Naturally, this is the same for regional, national and global levels.

Ultimately, it's about being a part of a community and taking responsibility for it; AS the Apostle Paul taught the church is to be, if it's a true part of the Church of Jesus Christ.

At the end of August, I was really trying to listen for the Spirit to tell me what direction our Scripture lessons should be going in, and what kept coming up was Judges. And I thought about it, it hadn't been something that we'd spent very much time in at all, and so I started getting my resources together. However, since I've really started digging into Judges, I'm realizing just why it is that that Spirit was pushing me toward the book. As we get into it, we'll see that we today can easily seem to be in such a period as the time of the Judges. Society kind of running amuck and divided, most turning their heads from God, with even more turning their heads from the church and their neighbors; which I do blame in great part the church for.

I dare say that we all know what I'm talking about. The assassination of Charlie Kirk, as tragic as the example is, is unfortunately just one of many examples of the violence that has become really political in nature, not only societal, and has become sadly pretty regular. Just weeks before the Kirk killing, the Speaker of the Minnesota house was assassinated in her home with her husband and dog - leaving two teenagers, the governor's residence in Pennsylvania was set ablaze in the middle of the night earlier this year in an attempt to kill him and any members of his family in the residence. There are unfortunately other examples, with all of this particular type of violence of course only being divisive and dividing. No matter 'what side' we may see ourselves on, we have to learn from history and understand that division within society has never ended in a positive way. My personal advice; always check the sources that you are reading or hearing and be sure that they're reliable, because most are not. Take that seriously and ask questions! But the big question in regard to this all is, what can we do about it, even though I know that we probably more often than not feel rather helpless? I do believe that the only way that we can push back on this, is to be the church, but to be what the church was really always meant to be. I'm going to let Paul take it from here.....

*"Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church: the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists and the pastors and teachers. Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ. This will continue until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ.*

*Then we will no longer be immature like children. We won't be tossed and blown about by every wind of new teaching. We will not be influenced when people try to trick us with lies so clever they sound like the truth. Instead, we will speak the truth in love, growing in every way more and more like Christ, who is the head of his body, the church. He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love." - Ephesians 4: 11-16*

Dear Church Family,

Here we go again as we do at this time of the year; when we talk about budgets for the coming year and how stewardship of the church is a responsibility that each of us carries. Blah, blah, blah... We've all heard it before. So instead, I'd like us to consider all of this from a bit of a differing angle and try to consider what it would mean to this community if the Presbyterian Church was no longer viable and had to close its doors, like so many churches already have. Would it be missed?

Clearly the first thing that would come to our minds, I'd hope, would be that this place that we gather at would no longer exist for us to be a community in. No more Sunday services, no more weddings or baptisms, no funerals or funeral luncheons. No genuinely safe space to come to with our families, or our children or our grandchildren. No more Christmas Eve's. That would all just be no longer there and would instead just become a part of our fond memories. There would be no rummage sale, and there'd be no Senior Saints, or Women's Association, or Bible Studies, or Food Pantry, or Farmer's Market, or Ladies' Tea, or a place for the West Milford players, or Boy Scouts, or VBS, or Aunt Jenny's, or dinners or coffee hours, and I know that the list could go on.

One of the things that I think about, and this very well may be the nerd coming out in me, but I often think about the church in years past; when the buggies would pull up in front of the church to drop folks off before parking, and I'm sure that the men, just like most men today would always be the ones to do that task. The women would be wearing dresses to the floor, with some also wearing what we'd label as fancy hats. The men would always be in their Sunday finest, and there'd always be a lot of kids running around, and someone would always notice the way they were acting and be dismayed at the kids being kids.

In many ways, the church has changed and progressed. Can you imagine the stories that those church walls could tell from over the course of their two hundred years?! But, in other ways, the church is still very much the same; it's a community of people that sees our lives interconnected and reliant upon each other, as well as sensing and understanding the reliance we have on our God. Understanding that this life does take a village is also a big part of that, and then of course, that the church is essentially the center of that village.

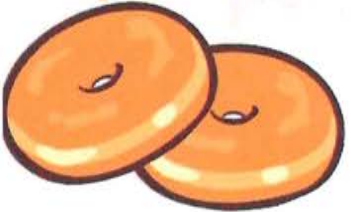
